Partnership with ECU Health

Farmville Public Library and ECU Health have established a new partnership to offer access to several much needed services, including HealthNow Virtual Care. Through HealthNow Virtual Care, any community member can visit the Library to have a "Teladoc" appointment using our Wi-Fi and private room spaces. ECU Health has provided the necessary basic medical equipment needed when communicating with a doctor (thermometer, blood pressure monitor, and pulse oximeter). They have also provided information on how to speak to a doctor about your condition and a booklet to help keep track of annual screenings and wellness visits.

ECU Health and Equity Specialist, Charmaine Reeder, has also given the Library materials to help anyone on Medicaid access assistance with: food, housing, transportation, employment, healthcare, and insurance. She will be at the Library the second Wednesday of each month to give people one-on-one assistance, as well. Ask at the second floor desk about a "Health Equity Needs Assessment" that can be complete at any time. We will email your needs assessment to Ms. Reeder and she will contact you personally to arrange a meeting to discuss how her organization can help.

Ms. Reeder also provided information about Pitt County housing resources and monthly ECVC meetings at Joy Soup Kitchen (700 Albemarle Ave in Greenville). ECVC representatives can "refer individuals to DSS – Food & Nutrition – Employment &Training Services; Vocational Rehabilitation, and more". Stop by the Library today for more information.
